# Settling In

- During the month of September/October the children have been phased in over a settling in period.
- ► All children will settle at different rates.
- Settling In Report in October. Follow-up phone call/meeting.



### Nursery Routine

- Nursery doors open at **8.50am**.
- Our nursery routines begin at **9am**.
- Collection time is 1:20pm.

#### Typical Nursery Routine:

- ▶ **8.50am** Morning routines/settle in
- ▶ **9.00am** Welcome time
- ▶ **9.15am** Free Play/ Group activities/Rolling snack
- ▶ **10.30am** Teaching and Rhymes
- ▶ 10.40am Outdoor Play
- ▶ 11.30am Story/Songs, wash hands
- ▶ 11.50am Lunch/Dinner
- ▶ **12.30pm** Circle Time/Outdoor Play/Indoor Games/Music time
- ► **1.00pm** Story/Songs
- ▶ **1.20pm** Home

# Drop Off Times

- Always walk your child up to the nursery door.
- Nursery door opens at **8.50am**.
- It is very important for your child's learning that they are in school for 9am, when their learning begins. Small group sessions often begin at this time.
- If they arrive later they may miss routines. Routine is extremely important for nursery children.
- Please close outdoor Nursery gate behind you.



# Tips for Drop Off Time

- Establish an arrival routine ('bye'/hug/kiss/high five). Consistency is key.
- Setting up these routines help your child to feel secure and safe in their environment.
- Keep goodbyes short and sweet. Lingering can make your child anxious.





# Tips for Drop Off Time

- ► Build confidence in your child by talking about nursery in a positive way.
- Ask open-ended questions:

  Instead of; 'Did you have a good day?'

  Try; 'What was in the sand tray today?'
- Encourage independence. Pack their bag together. Getting your child involved in the preparation can help to get them excited for the nursery day.





### Car Park

- ▶ We are fortunate to have a large car park across the road to park in when dropping off and collecting children.
- ▶ DO NOT park in bus lanes.
- Avoid parking along the road also, as this can significantly limit visibility for other pedestrians.
- Please ensure other people who are collecting your child are aware of this also.

### Morning Routine



1. Drop your child off at the nursery door.





3. They will do the self-register



2. They will find their peg and hang up their bag and coat.



4. Say goodbyes and go in to play!

# Nursery Folders

Children will use nursery folders to carry artwork, important information or books home.

It helps promote independence as it's your child's own personal school bag.

These can be purchased at the Nursery for £7.

(Alternatively, you can reuse one that you may already have.)



### Collection Times

- ▶ It is important that all children are collected on time at 1.20pm.
- Children can often become very anxious if they are not collected on time.
- ► The nursery staff also have other duties after 1:20pm so it is important that the children are collected so we can carry out these duties.
- ► Children will be in the Quiet Room at collection time and the nursery team will help children get packed up for going home.
- ➤ Your child must be collected by one of the named adults. If they are getting collected by someone else, we must be told in advance.

# Nursery Fees

- Nursery fees are paid monthly and cost £15 per month.
- These fees largely contribute towards the children's snack in the morning.
- We give the children a variety of healthy snacks and the opportunity to taste a wide range of foods.
- We buy ingredients to bake with the children and make play dough.
- Your contribution is also used to fund seasonal treats, school trips and visitors to the nursery.



### Lunch Time

- Lunch time is an opportunity to extend learning.
- During lunch time our nursery team help the children develop their personal and social skills which are appropriate at lunch time.
- ► Children can bring in their own packed lunch or hot meals can be purchased at a price of £2.50.
- Dinner menus will be sent out termly and hot meals must be purchased/booked on a **Sunday** for the week ahead using the **Parent Pay app**.
- If your child has any **allergies**, please let us know.
- ▶ We have a strict **no nuts** policy.

#### Personal, Social and Emotional Development

We provide opportunities for children to be able to;

- Celebrate success- Child of the Day
- Listen attentively to others
- Use appropriate behaviour
- Develop independence through routines (eg putting on aprons)
- Take responsibility for their belongings.
- Take turns, share
- Persist with activities
- Respect their environment
- Show empathy for others through stories
- Learn ways to stay healthy and maintain personal hygiene eg dentist
- Learn how to stay safe







# Personal, Social and Emotional Development Examples of how can I help at home

### Encourage your child to:

- Tidy up and show respect for environment
- Look after belongings, getting dressed
- Encourage to persist at challenging tasks
- Share, take turns, say please and thank you
- Talk about how to stay healthy, clean and safe





# Personal, Social and Emotional Development Examples of how can I help at home

#### Talk about feelings:

- Acknowledge and discuss emotions
- Talk about how characters might feel in stories
- Talk about how their actions can affect others and have clear boundaries
- Talk about what makes a good friend
- ▶ Be consistent
- Praise all the good things your child does.

# Physical Development Gross Motor Skills

Many of these skills can also be reinforced at home/after-school activities.

Gross motor skills so important for long term health and cognitive development.

During the day children are given opportunities to:

Run, jump, hop, climb, throw and catch

- ► These help children to develop balance, control and co-ordination.
- ▶ They are important for long term health and wellbeing.
- Outdoor play improves children's confidence and problem solving skills. It is often adapted to provide new challenges.
- It gives them opportunities to develop friendships, to share and to co-operate with others.

# Physical Development Fine Motor Skills

Good fine motor skills of hands and fingers lead to good writing skills.

During the day children are given opportunities to:

- Play with equipment- pouring, building, working with playdough or clay to squeeze, roll or twist them.
- ▶ Put on their coat, pour their milk.
- ► Use scissors, pencils, paint, jigsaws and construction toys.
- ► Children all develop at different levels.

#### Language Development

#### We aim for children to;

- Develop attention and listening through games and activities (it is the first step when developing language and talking)
- Communicate needs and ideas to others
- ▶ Become aware of sounds (phonics) e.g. 'I Spy'
- ► Develop good memory of vocabulary
- Listen to stories and access to books throughout the day
- ► Retell stories
- Develop book handling skills (turn pages, notice print)
- Mark make/write for meaning
- Recognise text (such as, letters in name or familiar vocabulary).

### Language Development

### How can I help at home?

- ► Get your child's attention (looking, take turns)
- Provide a talking time (e.g. family dinners)
- ► Sing/recall nursery rhymes
- Limit screen time
- Go to library and read books provided from Nurse
- ▶ Big Bedtime Read (event in November) GRTL
- ► Read often
- Play 'I Spy' and rhyming games
- Provide opportunity for 'writing'
- Learn to recognise/write name

### Early Mathematical Experiences


We aim for children to;


- ▶ Use mathematical language throughout the day (e.g. big, small)
- Develop understanding of numbers and sequence through rhymes and play. Begin to recognise numbers and touch-count. Use ICT.
- ► Identify and describe shapes (talk about half, whole)
- Develop an awareness of space (e.g. estimate how many fit inside...)
- Describe the size and quantities (e.g. big, small, full, empty)
- Make connections and problem solve
- ► Recognise patterns
- Develop awareness of sequencing and time

#### The Arts

We provide opportunities for children to;

- Express creativity and imagination through painting, drawing, make models, glue, explore various textures and colours.
- Work with malleable materials (e.g. dough, clay)
- Listen to and join with rhymes and songs.
- Create and explore various sounds; using their voice, instruments and everyday objects
- Role-play through themselves or small world objects.

### The Arts How can I help at home?

Encourage your child to:

- ▶ Draw and create freely (not colouring sheets fine motor)
- ► Create sounds using objects around the house
- ► Sing songs and nursery rhymes
- ► Develop imagination through stories
- Create a roleplay area at home. Act out roles with your child.

We aim for children to;

- Begin to make sense of the world they live in
- Provide outside visitors to enhance experiences (Parents?)
- Learn new vocabulary through various topics
- Discuss e.g. weather, change of materials, festivals, observe plants grow, discuss lifecycles, people who help us, where we live.

## The World Around Us How can I help at home?

Encourage your child to:

- ▶ Be curious
- ► Ask questions
- ► Investigate
- Introduce new vocabulary
- Read non-fiction books
- Go for walks/days out/experiences

#### Other ways you can help your child

- Establish early bedtime routine, to ensure children are getting enough sleep for a busy day ahead.
- ▶ Be patient. Promote independence e.g. dressing and undressing, toileting, washing hands, blowing their nose, using a knife and a fork.
- Practise good attention and listening.
- Read lots of books and ask questions.
- ► Challenge and encourage persistence

#### Behaviour

- We aim to ensure that the nursery is a happy, secure and caring environment so this means that the children observe simple rules of behaviour.
- Acceptable behaviour means showing respect for each other at all times by sharing and taking turns. It involves following instructions, cooperating with the staff and observing the rules for indoor and outdoor play.



#### Toileting

- ► We would expect all children to be fully toilet trained before beginning nursery full time, unless they have additional needs.
- ► Please look at the prospectus to find ways to develop your child's independence and the procedures we have in place if your child has a toilet accident.
- Each child should have a full change of clothes which will be kept in the nursery throughout the year.
- The change of clothes should be brought into the nursery on your child's first day in a plastic bag.
- It is important that your child's name is on the plastic bag and each piece of clothing.

#### Communication

- You will receive information throughout the year through text messages, Seesaw, monthly SWAY newsletters, topic information sheets, the school website and Facebook.
- Seesaw will be used as a way to share photos of your child in nursery, share useful activities for the children to complete and to keep you informed of school events. It is not reliable source of communicating important messages as I often check it once a day.
- Parent-teacher meetings will take place on February/March and you will receive a report at the end of the year.
- If you have any queries or concerns please speak to Mrs Cowan at drop off or collection time or ring the school office to arrange a meeting.
- If your child is absent for any reason, please contact the school office.

- Nursery Graduation (June)




